
Program timelines

Fall to-do list for energy savings

Ensure all vents are unblocked.

Be certain floor vents are unblocked and return vents are clean. Schedule HVAC maintenance and change the filters. Maintaining your system helps it last longer and run more efficiently.



Change ceiling fan direction.

Fans should run clockwise in cool weather to circulate warm air.



Check all door/ window seals.

Weather-stripping and caulk can wear out with time. Install new as needed.

Cover drafty windows.

Curtains and blinds may be enough or look into energysaving plastic window films.



Pull out the quilts, blankets and sweaters.

Be ready so you won't rush to change the thermostat when feeling a chill.





Check insulation for wear and settling.

Be sure your insulation level is still in good shape.



Schedule fireplace inspection.

For safety and efficiency, make sure the fireplace chimney and damper are in good shape.





Budget Billing fall cycle begins soon

With Budget Billing, we average the last 12 months of usage and determine a budget amount. Members pay that same amount each month for 11 months and on the 12th month settle up with a credit or additional balance due depending on actual electricity used for the year. Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

Did you know using your dishwasher is more energy efficient than washing a load of dishes by hand? To maximize efficiency, wash full loads in the dishwasher and don't block the arms or other parts that move while the appliance is in use.

For additional savings, turn on the "air dry" setting instead of using the "heat dry" setting and use a rinse aid to help dishes dry faster without spotting and streaking.

Vanquishing energy vampires

Less sinister than the real thing, an energy vampire is a playful name for idle devices in your home that drain, or "suck," small amounts of energy all the time.


Identifying these vampires involves taking a walk through your home, garage and outdoor buildings looking for devices that use power all the time. You might want to repeat this at night to be certain you've seen them all.

Notice any digital clocks? The microwave and stove surely, but any others? Now look around for all those tiny red or green power indicator lights. Your television is easy to spot, and the modem and Wi-Fi router too. Will you find a video game console, computer, printer, DVR or smart speaker? Did you know that anything that responds to a remote or voice command uses power to stay in "ready" mode? And don't forget about all those battery chargers that consume energy even when a device is not charging. The one for your phone, of course, but perhaps your cordless drill, other tools and lawn equipment, headphones, game controller, tablet, laptop or vacuum.

How many vampires will you discover? Granted, these are often very small sources of electricity usage, but like pennies in a coin jar, they add up over time. Some estimate that together they could total 10% or more of your home's energy use.

Korner Recommendation: Fight back! Vanquish the vampires you can. Unplug what you don't need, especially all those chargers. Check your television and game console settings for energy efficiency features and consider turning off the instant-on feature for your television. New options on online bill pay site

Have you visited our new online bill pay site yet? Click the Pay Online button on our website at www.menard.com, or the Payments button on the MyMEC App to access.

Quick Pay – You can pay your bill without having to register or log in. Simply visit the site, click Quick Pay, enter the account number and phone number for the service and you'll be able to submit a payment.

Average Billing – If you select average billing, we'll take a rolling 12-month average of your electric bills to determine the amount due each month. The amount could fluctuate monthly but will eliminate large seasonal fluctuations. Your bill and the online portal will show the amount due, the actual billed amount and the true-up amount. The true-up credit or amount due would be applied to get the account to a zero balance if the account were removed from average billing or disconnected. To select this option, click on Average Billing in the Billing & Payments drop-down menu, then click the dots in the Average Billing column to select Sign Up.

Notifications – You may select the following notifications to help you manage your account:

- 1. Bill Creation
- 2. 7-Day Due Date Reminder
- 3. Payment Receipt
- 4. Cutoff Notification

To select, click on Notifications in the My Account drop-down menu, then select your choices.
